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Food Bank of Central & Eastern North Carolina New Administrator for TEFAP in Columbus County

WILMINGTON – The Food Bank of Central & Eastern North Carolina, one of seven Feeding America member food banks in North Carolina, now administers The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) in Columbus County through the Wilmington Branch. Located at 1314 Marstellar Street in Wilmington, the Branch also administers TEFAP for New Hanover and Pender Counties. TEFAP is the Federal commodities program that helps to provide food assistance to low-income households. The food was formerly distributed to qualifying Columbus County households through Four County Community Services. Now TEFAP commodities are distributed via local food pantries that are partnered with the Food Bank.

In North Carolina, individuals and families whose incomes are at or below 200 percent of the Federal Poverty Guideline qualify to receive TEFAP commodities. For example, a family of four that earns \$44,700 or less each year qualifies to receive TEFAP commodities. Any household that receives Food and Nutrition Services (i.e. Food Stamp) benefits automatically qualifies to receive TEFAP commodities.
